Dear Residents.

The current economic climate is affecting everyone, and I know that it has meant significant changes to lifestyle for some residents. In response to the challenges facing many across our communities we are working with our partners to do what we can to support them. There is a lot of useful information available on our website and at the back of this leaflet to help you with planning and advice during the cost of living crisis.

To protect core services for residents and considering the significant cost increases across our business operation, plus the impact of the pandemic and the fact that the increase in local government funding hasn't been in line with inflation, we have had to make significant savings on top of those that we made last year.

The proposed budget for 2023/24 was published in December 2022. We worked hard to keep increases to council tax, and fees and charges as low as we could and certainly significantly below the level of inflation. I appreciate that any cost increases in the current climate might be a worry, but without those unavoidable changes, we will not be able to deliver important projects that we have promised you in our Annual Plan:

- Continuing to refurbish all car parks in Mole Valley including the installation of 90 electric vehicle charging points
- Major developments in Leatherhead including Claire & James House, the Swan Centre and Bull Hill
- Progress the regeneration of the Foundry and Church Street in Dorking
- Secure funding for the future refurbishment of Pippbrook House in Dorking
- Retain the Mole Valley Employment and Skills Hub in Leatherhead, providing invaluable support to residents and businesses that need it the most

Annual Plan Projects

Mole Valley Employment and Skills Hub

Our free independent service available to all residents of Mole Valley, is now in its second year and thriving. The Hub can help with job searches, applications, CV writing and skills training. Partner organisations regularly visit the Hub (at the Swan Centre in Leatherhead) to offer advice on the rising cost of living, energy grants, household budgeting, mental health and wellbeing.

Four car parks in Dorking were refurbished last year: Southside, West Street, South Street and Junction Road. The car parks have been re-surfaced, re-lined and spaces made wider where possible. Mole Valley Life

Working in partnership with Surrey County Council, Mole Valley Life launched a new pilot Community Wellbeing & Responder service in March 2022, as part of the award-winning 'Enabling You with Technology' pilot. To date, the service has attended 640 lifeline alarm call outs, with an average response time of 24 minutes, resulting in 79% of call outs being resolved at the scene without the need for an ambulance.

Mole Valley Community Lottery

Revamped Fetcham Playground

Networking lunches take place on a monthly basis, covering topics such as public speaking and how to cut business energy costs. 1. Use less energy by switching to LED light bulbs, washing your laundry with colder water and hanging things to dry.

2. Walk, cycle or take public transport - not only will it help reduce greenhouse gas emissions, it's good for your health and fitness!

There are collection points throughout the week, all over Mole Valley.



Save on your energy consumption

Switch off standby

You can save around £65 a vear just by remembering to turn your appliances off standby mode.



Draught-proof window & doors

Unless your home is very new, you will lose some heat through draughts around doors and windows, gaps around the floor, or through the chimney. Draught-proofing can save around £125 a year.

Lights

Turning off lights when you're not using them will save £25 a year. Replacing all lights in your home with LED bulbs could help you save even more.

Be wise with your washing

You could save £34 a year by using your washing machine more carefully; use your washing machine on a 30-degree cycle and reduce its use by one a week.

Water



Spend less time in the shower a four-minute shower could save £95 a year. Swapping one bath a week with a 4-minute shower could save you £20 a year.

Be savvy in the kitchen

Avoid overfilling your kettle and you could save £13 a year. Only run your dishwasher when it's full - reducing the run once a week for a year could save £17.
